In The Moment...



Thank you to all parents for their weekly input to support our in the moment planning process. The never ending change to our environment keeps learning exciting and alive in a huge variety of interest based themes. It is great to see that so many children now have reading, writing or drawing as a keen interest outside of school too.

Last term we had a great deal of children become enthused by junk modelling. Our outdoor house has now become a recycling centre, with junk modelling available as a continued provision, although children have already let their imaginations run wild and turned it into a spider cave, coffee shop and builders yard in the last week alone. This freedom of exploration and imagination really does allow children to expand their knowledge and develop their thought processes with very few limitations!

As the weather improves we will also be able to utilise our outdoor space much more. Lots of children really enjoy using bikes for example, and we hope to have further use of our balance bikes during our 'In the Moment' session, often referred to as choosing or double choosing!

Magnificent Mathematics!

Our Maths knowledge is ever expanding and children are developing fantastic recording skills. Our key aspect of learning in maths is the understanding and application of number. Children need to realise that numbers are a universal language and can be used in a wide range of contexts.

Why not try to explore this at home or while you are out and about. Perhaps while shopping you could count the number of items in your basket, or count the number of steps up to the slide then count backwards on your way down.

Making numbers a part of a child's everyday language will only help to further promote their understanding and use of these in more formal situations.



Phonics so far...

Robins this year are flying forward in their phonics knowledge. We are now working on Phase 5b of letters and Sounds, where we learn to alternate the sounds made by letters in a word, for example the letter 'O' makes one sound in *on* and a different sound in *don't*. It is important, particularly to aid spelling, to recognise these differences in our very complex and confusing language.

To support phonics it is important to identify letters as their letter name, i.e. what they are called in the alphabet. It should then be your child's job to work out the sound the letter is making. When trialling alternative pronunciations they may wish to re-read a word a couple of times to decipher how best to pronounce it. When a child incorrectly identifies a sound we ask "Is that a real word or a nonsense word?" often the child will realise and then re-attempt the word.

Reading is another aspect of learning that needs to become less pressured. Allow your child to read at their own pace and at a time that they are comfortable with. Often children are too tired to read after school so perhaps make this a breakfast time activity. Making a child read after school is like making you do your job again when you get home, at 4 or 5 years old that can be a very hard thing to do. Make reading as fun and comfortable as possible, letting your children take the lead.

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
