Until then, your teachers will keep on trying their best for you for the rest of the term by staying in touch via your class email. I am so impressed by what I have seen from you - working independently, having to work things out for yourself and helping out around the house! I know how hard you are working, and you inspire me to work hard too.

All of the staff have been thinking about each and every one of you and are missing you all so dearly. The corridors are much quieter without you all, but if I am using my honesty value, I do prefer them noisier!

Mrs Sebborn and I have been having lots of discussions recently too; we are both thinking about children who may be feeling very anxious or worried for whatever reason. Mrs Sebborn is brilliant at helping children cope with anxiety and talking to them about their worries and, sadly, she isn't able to do that at the moment. Instead, she and I have made lots of phone calls and are happy to put some activities together if you feel like you would like them.

If you have not done so already, come and look at Sid the Values snake. Ms Harvey's incredible idea has meant lots of children and people from our community have added colourful pebbles to Sid and now he is growing very long!
