We compare similarities and differences between our environment and in Africa ie: desert.</p> <p>Our environment - We explore the environment around us being countryside and visit Houghton Conquest Forest. We will make observations of the environment and create drawings of the Orchard.</p> <p>Season of Summer - On a nature walk, we discuss similarities and differences between the seasons of spring and summer.</p> <p>Natural World - We explore the Life Cycle of a Butterfly and a Frog to understand the natural process and changes in the natural world.</p> <p>Growing - We will grow a sunflower from seed and create a sunflower diary. We will draw pictures of the plant at each stage.</p>	<p><u>Past and Present</u></p> <p>Famous People in the past - We introduce Gerald Durrell, a Conservationist and look at how important his work was.</p> <p>Occupations - We introduce Sir David Attenborough an author, naturalist, film director, TV presenter and journalist and learn about his important world of looking after our planet.</p> <p>Farming - We will make butter using an old tradition by hand.
