4. Write an invitation inviting a snowman to come and play.
5. Write a story about a 'The Best Snow Day Ever'
6. Write a poem about the snow.

Years 3 and 4- Chose one of the following tasks







1. Write a descriptive paragraph about what you can see outside your window. Use your senses - what can you see, what can you hear, how do you feel?
2. Create a recipe on 'How to make the best sandwich' - can you make it and take a photograph?
3. Write a re-count about you playing in the snow today. Remember to use adjectives and conjunctions.
4. Write a story about a snowy adventure.
5. Write an acrostic poem using the phrase 'Snow Day'

Extra Challenges:

1. Create a newspaper article about the snow - this could be about the joy of snow or the dangers driving/walking in the snow.
2. Imagine the snowman you have built comes alive! How does this happen, what adventure does he go on? Write a story about your snowman's adventure.
3. Write a shape poem about the snow - you could use the shape of a snowman, snowflake, woolly hat, hot chocolate mug.
4. Write a Winter Story.

What can I smell in winter?

candles, chimney smoke, cinnamon, crisp
air, gingerbread, pine trees, smoky air,
peppermint

What can I taste in winter?

chestnuts, cinnamon, cranberries, fresh
snowflakes, gingerbread, hot cocoa,
pomegranate, sugar



How can I describe the snow?

blanketed, crunchy, drift, fluffy, flurry,
flutter, fresh, numbing, powdery, sleet,
slippery, sludgy, slushy, solid, thawed, wet

What can I hear in winter?

crackle, crunch, eerie howling, gales, hail, lashing
rain, pitter-patter, quiet, wailing, whistling

How can I describe a winter night?

biting, cosy, dark, foggy, long, misty, pitch black,
shimmering, silvery, snugly, twinkly



Fronted Adverbials

are words, phrases or clauses at the beginning of a sentence, which are used to describe the action that follows.
